"O come Lord Jesus, be our guest and may your gifts to us be blessed. And may there be a goodly share at every table everywhere."



Dear friends,

This is an old prayer, with variations of it. It can be sung to Tallis' canon or the Old 100th or just said together, whoever is around the table, or indeed if you eat on your own.

I know I enjoy my food, but it isn't just that. Jesus came ... well, what does the Bible say about Jesus' coming? He came "eating and drinking"! Yes, he also spoke of coming as One who serves (and that also has an immediate reference to what happens around a table where food is served); and he came to seek and save the lost – a teaching he gave to people who criticised the folk he was eating and drinking with. And he came "eating and drinking". So isn't that a thing? How basic it is that Jesus was someone to sit down with – to share refreshment with.

Stepping back, we see that it shows how Jesus came to bless. My quotations above are all from Luke's Gospel. For John's Gospel the memory is that Jesus came "that they might have life": Jesus the good shepherd knows how too many people in this world in effect sap the life out of others. It happens so drastically and awfully in Gaza at the moment, but it happens in less dramatic ways elsewhere too. Jesus came, on the contrary, to enrich daily living, his phrase was to live life to the full.

So? How good it is to share time together, as many of us know on a Sunday morning as part of what we do when we come together. And then also, to take time to have a coffee or tea with someone, or to have lunch, to treasure all that comes from eating and drinking together (not in excess!), that matters. And if as my prayer at the top says, we might hold on to Jesus being our guest also whenever we eat or drink, we might then draw on what is spiritual food and drink. Wisdom for life; hope through times of trials; love that will not let us go. These gifts come from God, and the more we let go so as to believe in that, the more we have faith, the better.

Jesus in Spirit loves to share time and prayer with us.

Harvest time, which we mark during September, is always a season to think on the importance of sharing. May we be generous. May we be profoundly thankful for all that has been given to us.

Shine Youth Theatre Group will entertain us on Thursday 23rd October at 7.30pm. Doors open at7.15pm.


Tickets are priced £10, and we hope to have a super turn out as they are such a talented group of young people.

For Prayer and Action

According to Open Doors World Watch List research, over 90% of Christians killed for their faith last year were in sub-Saharan Africa. This rising violence is being driven largely by Islamic extremists taking advantage of political instability in the region.

The number of people affected, and the area affected are both increasing rapidly. The region is facing a displacement crisis, with millions forced to flee their homes. Most of these people are living in camps for internally displaced people (IDPs) either in their own country or in neighbouring countries. Many have lost their means of livelihood too, as Islamic militants – particularly in Nigeria – take their land.

And yet the world has not noticed.

In response, the African church is calling for their brothers and sisters around the world to join them in the *Arise Africa* campaign. It aims to see that the global community acknowledges and acts against extreme violence and supports the church to persevere – and to be resilient, resourceful and influential.

Persecution is one of the major drivers of this displacement. It's not possible to say that all 16.2 million Christians have been displaced because of their faith, but there is strong evidence that many of them *have* been specifically targeted for following Jesus.

"When the terrorists come to churches and find Christians, they tell them that Christianity's time is over, and they should turn to the Islamic religion," says Pastor Soré in Burkina Faso. He and his family had to flee Islamic militants and now live in two tents in an isolated area with other vulnerable members from their community. "They warn Christians to stop conducting services. After warning, when they come back later and find you in the church, they kill you."

Pastor Soré remains confident in Jesus. "I do believe that we are displaced, but Jesus is not and will never be displaced from our lives," he says. "He is always with us."

There is a petition to be signed then! And prompts for prayer. A hard copy of the petition will be at church, but also material is available online: What is the Arise Africa campaign? - Open Doors UK & Ireland




We've enjoyed getting together over the summer – the weather was lovely, so we headed to the park on a couple of occasions and even enjoyed some ice lollies!

Social Media Managers - they will take photos at the meetings and update our private Facebook page;


Resource Managers - responsible for giving out, and collecting back in, any resources we need for the activity/craft we're doing;




