Our Foodbank project is still operating at this time on a reduced service, but equally an extremely busy time where we have naturally seen a big increase in demand.

Our Wednesday service is still operating from St. Edwards RC Church and we had to temporary relocate from Airdrie Baptist Church on a Friday as they have had a complete close down. We are extremely grateful to our linked friends at Cairnlea Parish Church for allowing us to operate on a Friday morning – a vital service before the weekend when there's no foodbanks operating.

We are also grateful to many local individuals and businesses who have made financial or food donations . Also, we have been allocated Engineers from British Gas who have been able to make deliveries of food parcels to people who are self isolating , collecting donations and generally helping with making sure things are ticking over at this busy time.

We have been successful with various emergency grant applications and thanks to Radio Clyde Cash for Kids, The Scottish Government, SCVO and CAF for their grant awards to help local children and families during this crisis.

Churches Together

The Moderator recently commented that he had had more contact, and very meaningful exchanges, during Lockdown with other church leaders than in all the months before. For myself, just in Airdrie and Calderbank, likewise the contacts with other ministers has been enhanced rather than diminished by our need to think imaginatively and supportively through these days. So one thing which has very much been to the fore has been the sense of praying for one another and praying with one another. Each Sunday, at 7 pm, there is an encouragement to join together in a common form of prayer, from which we then might be spurred to pray further. The Month of May

Since I had positive feedback about knowing in advance what passages we might be reading in Sunday worship, I'll try to keep some notice going on that! Traditionally the readings around Pentecost come from the book of Acts, so that prompted the thought that at least from late May we might do a series of readings in that book of the Bible. And before that, more of a miscellany...

Therefore, if you would like to be prepared, what about:

May $4^{th} - 10^{th}$ I'm suggesting this week we allow Psalm 31 to be our text. It's quite a long Psalm, so no need to read it just all in one day; or else, even if you do, come back to it a few times. Linger on any sentences or sections which strike you.

May $11^{th} - 17^{th}$ This would be the week to read John chapter 14. The early part of that will be known almost off by heart by some of you. But read it all.

May 18th - 24th This would be the time to open the book of Acts and read chapter 1 just. You might notice links with Luke's Gospel – read the very opening of Luke's Gospel (chapter 1, vv. 1-4); and also the very end of Luke's Gospel (ch. 24, vv. 50-52)

May 25th - 31st And this week, read Acts chapter 2. It speaks of the power of the Word when it is joined with the power of the Spirit.

June 1st – 7th Two chapters this week – Acts 3 and 4! Peter and John went to pray (do you know the song?).




Word search: Can you find the names of sixteen (16) of the 66 books of the Bible hidden in this paragraph?


